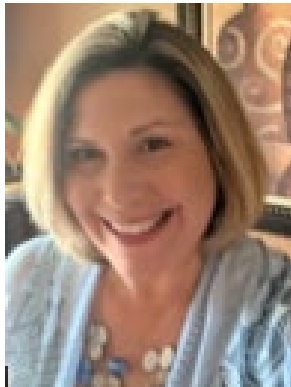


Jordan Denoncourt

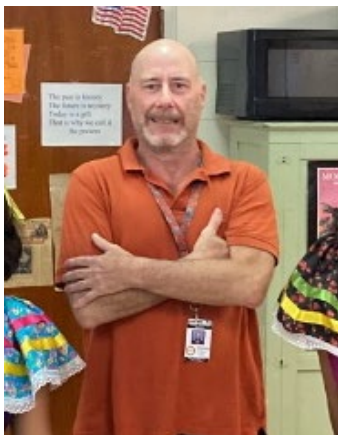


Korey Mitchell

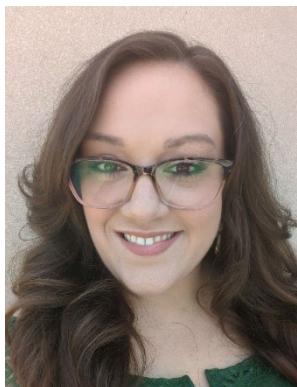


Joanne Van Eycke
