| Photographic Journey Through Asia: Students will create a PowerPoint pictorial journey that requires them to research, reflect, and display unique developmental trends for an assigned Asian country. The purpose of this project is for students to gain an understanding of the beauty, individuality and connection between cultures; identify trends and patterns within countries and between countries. |
| Learning Outcomes for Course |

| Description of Assignment |
| Photographic Journey Through Asia: Students will create a PowerPoint pictorial journey that requires them to research, reflect, and display unique developmental trends for an assigned Asian country. |

Completion throughout semester. 3-4 hours to research, completing and present the project.

Materials/Resources

- 1. Computer with access to PowerPoint or other presentation software.**
- 2. Research on designated country for cultural trends/practices**
- 3. Pictures from websites and other resources displaying the given culture.**
- 4. See list of resources below**

Procedure

1. Each student will be assigned a country in Asia to research throughout the semester. The countries will be assigned randomly the first week of classes.
2. Students will create a PowerPoint presentation on an assigned Asian country to be shared in class. The presentation must include: basic demographic information, country map and flag, real pictures illustrating life in the country for each developmental stage, one unique cultural practice for each developmental stage, and a reference list. Students will also be required to include a reflection about what the student learned from their research and a statement about how this impacts their understanding of global awareness.

The PowerPoint should be completed as follows:

- 1. Power Point Presentation (200 points)**
 - a. Presentations should be 12 slides long, a breakdown of what is to be on each slide is listed below.**
 - Slide 1. Title slide, Students name, instructors name, course and section number, country name and country flag
 - Slide 2. Introductory slide, map of country, general demographics of country
 - Slides 3-9. Students should include a unique cultural practice for each developmental stage; Students must have real pictures showing the cultural practice.
 - Slide 10. Students need to end their presentation with a reflection of what they learned from this project. Students should discuss what they have learned about different cultures and how this impacts their understanding of global awareness.
 - Slide 11. Other pictures to illustrate the uniqueness about your country
 - Slide 12. References
- 3. A complete Reference Page (50 points);** this should be the final slide of the Presentation.

You may use references from online newspapers, journals, or magazines, but be sure that they are from a reputable source.

 - a. Wikipedia or wiki anything does not count as a valid reference.
 - b. You should use resources that have a .org, .gov, .mil, or .edu
 - c. Avoid most .com and .net sites as a whole.

- d. Always check your facts to be sure you are getting accurate information.
- e. If possible, use NC LIVE or another Research only site, the library is a great source for this part. (Password can be found on the Library's techlink page)

- APA citation is required throughout the presentation and on the Discussion Board, give credit where credit is due!
- You will need a minimum of 5 sources other than your text.
- You must also cite your pictures.
- FAILURE TO PROPERLY CITE YOUR SOURCES WITHIN THE TEXT OF YOUR PROJECT AND PROVIDE THE FULL REFERENCE WHEN PARAPHRASING OR USING A DIRECT QUOTE WILL RESULT IN A ZERO FOR THE ASSIGNMENT AND POSSIBLE DISMISSAL FROM THE COURSE.
