Developmental Psychology (PSY 241)
This course is a study of human growth and development. Emphasis is placed on major theories and perspectives as they relate to the physical, cognitive, and psychosocial aspects of development from conception to death. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate knowledge of development across the life span.
Student Assignment or Activity
Moral and Emotional Development Through Children’s Literature: Students will read children’s stories from different Asian cultures. Students will discuss the moral, emotional and social messages within the story.
Learning Outcomes for Course
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Develop an appreciation for the complexities of human behavior and understand the ways in which human behavior is affected by biological, psychological, social, cultural, and historical factors.• Describe the physical development of humans, beginning with the three stages of prenatal development, including periods of infancy, childhood, adolescence, young and middle adulthood, and concluding with physical changes associated with the later adult years.• Demonstrate knowledge of the major theories of cognitive, moral, psychosexual, and psychosocial development, and be able to identify major accomplishments, limitations, and challenges of each stage.• Demonstrate an understanding of the particular needs of individuals at each stage of development and apply this understanding in dealing with individuals in personal and professional relationships.• Demonstrate an understanding of the psychological processes involved in death and grief and be aware of current trends in hospice care, living wills, and euthanasia.

Description of Assignment

Each group will be given a children's story to read and analyze. 3. Students will answer questions on provided attachment in small group. 4. Students will discuss finding with full group. 5. Students will reconvene in small group to finish worksheet. 6. Worksheet turned in at end of class for grade
