



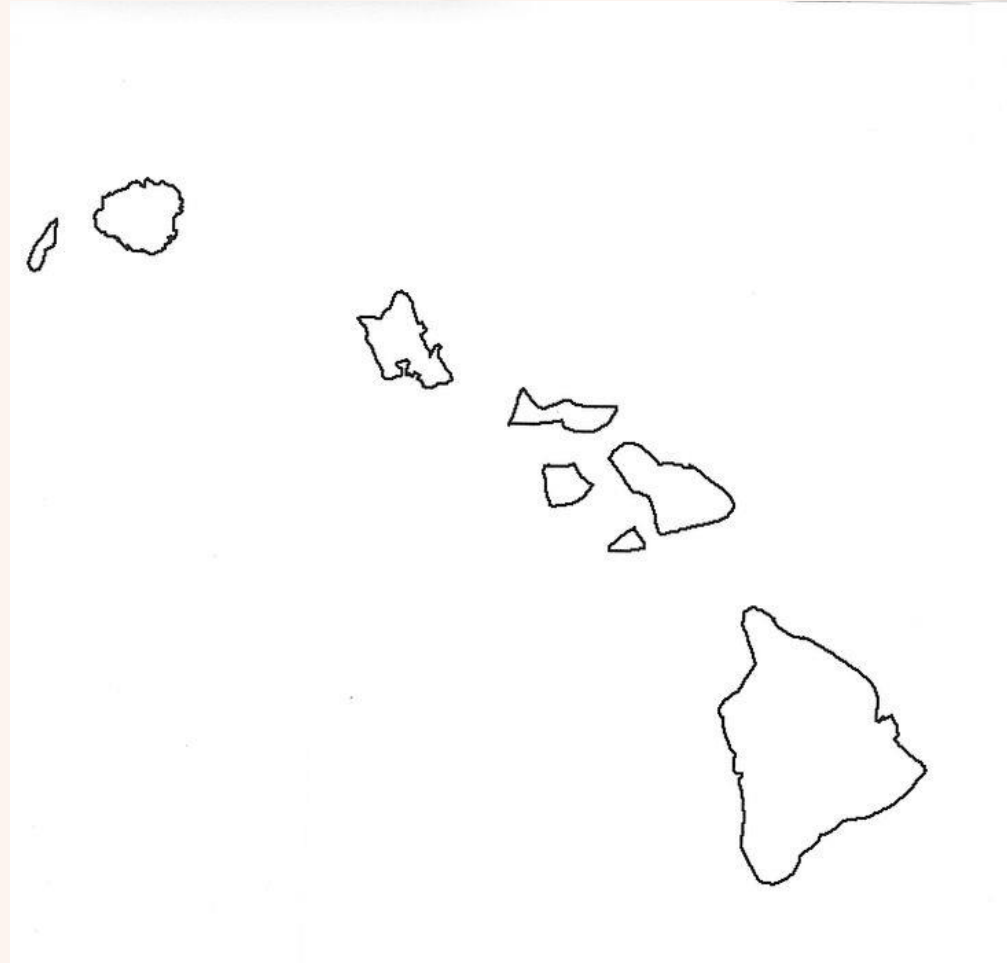

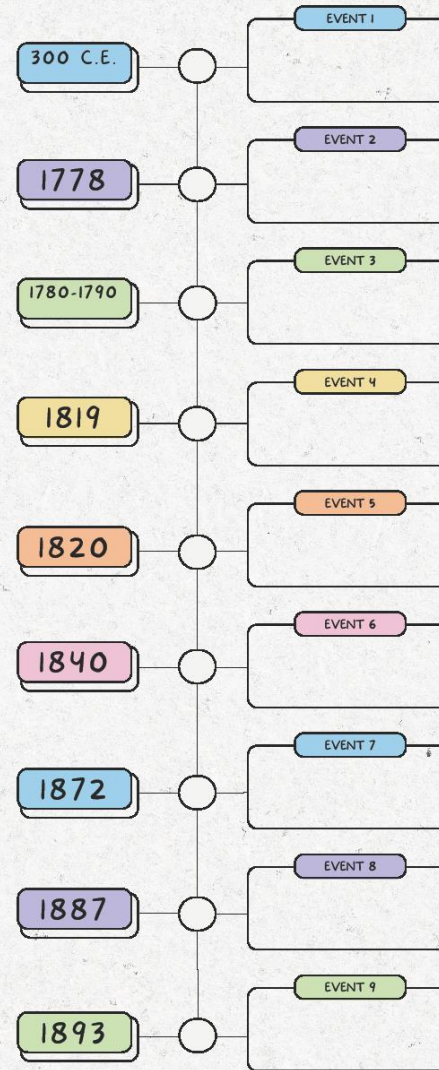

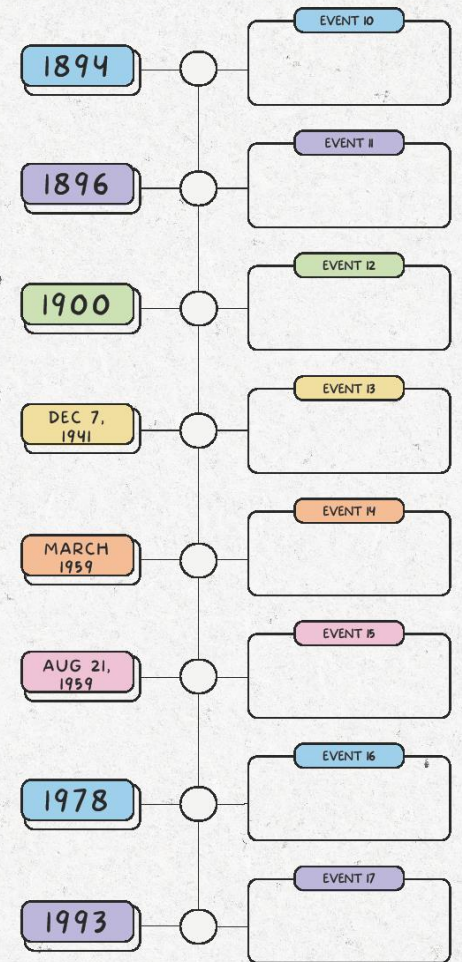

Culture vs. Tradition

Culture

- Culture is the collective term to identify the ideas, customs, and social behavior of particular people or society.
- Culture is a vast area.
- A particular culture can be observed among a particular group of people.
- Culture is created by a group of people, over a long period of time.

Tradition

- Traditions are the ideas and beliefs that are passed down from one generation to another generation.
- Traditions are part of the culture.
- Some cultures are unique to some families.
- Traditions can be created by individuals.
